Camille (with her partner Madison McDonald) also began to excel on the beach last summer as 14 year olds competing in the 16U division. They finished 1st at the AVA Beach Provincials, 2nd in Western Canadians Beach Elites and 3<sup>rd</sup> at Nationals, despite being two years younger than most of their opposition.

This indoor club season Camille led her Canuck Spice team to a 2nd place finish at Provincials and 10th at Nationals in the 16U category, even though she and the majority of her teammates are 15 year olds. Volleyball is still the ultimate activity for Camille and it brings out the best in her. One of her most admirable attributes is she loves when her teammates are performing to the best of their abilities. She has a wonderful knack for shrugging off mistakes and helping her team to move on to the next play if someone has made an error. Camille's latest honor is that she has been selected to one of the 16U Provincial teams and is very much looking forward to the experience. We know she will make the most of it and expect she will put a few smiles on the faces of her teammates as well.
